**LIQUIDATOR'S MOTION FOR APPROVAL OF  
SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT WITH PHILIPS ELECTRONICS NORTH AMERICA  
CORPORATION AND T. H. AGRICULTURE & NUTRITION, L.L.C.**

Roger A. Sevigny, Insurance Commissioner for the State of New Hampshire, as Liquidator ("Liquidator") of The Home Insurance Company ("Home"), moves that the Court enter an order in the form submitted herewith approving a Settlement Agreement and Mutual Release ("Settlement Agreement") between Philips Electronics North America Corporation ("PENAC"), T. H. Agriculture & Nutrition, L.L.C. ("THAN") (collectively, "Claimants"), and the Liquidator. As reasons therefor, the Liquidator states as follows:

1. The Settlement Agreement was negotiated under the supervision of the Special Deputy Liquidator. Affidavit of Peter A. Bengelsdorf in Support of Motion for Approval of Settlement Agreement with Philips Electronics North America Corporation and T H Agriculture & Nutrition, L.L.C. ("Bengelsdorf Aff.") ¶ 2. A copy of the Settlement Agreement is attached hereto as Exhibit A. The Settlement Agreement is subject to approval by the Court. Settlement Agreement ¶ 1. Bengelsdorf Aff. ¶ 5.

2. Home issued six insurance policies to North American Philips Corporation, predecessor to PENAC, for various periods between March 31, 1969 and July 1, 1986 ("Policies"). THAN is a subsidiary of PENAC. Upon Home's placement in liquidation, PENAC filed proofs of claim in the Home liquidation estate, including claims with respect to claims

against the THAN Asbestos Personal Injury Trust. Settlement Agreement, first through third Whereas clause. Bengelsdorf Aff. ¶ 3.

3. The Liquidator previously issued to PENAC, and this Court has approved, claim determinations respecting certain of PENAC's proofs of claim in the amount of \$3,857,941.25, \$455,221.86, and \$478,800.37 as Class II priority claims under RSA 402-C:44 (the "Partial Allowances"). Settlement Agreement, sixth Whereas clause. Bengelsdorf Aff. ¶ 4.

4. The Settlement Agreement provides that the Liquidator will issue and recommend for the Court's approval, an additional PENAC claim determination regarding PENAC's remaining proofs of claim in the amount of \$7,000,000 as a Class II priority claim under RSA 402-C:44 (the "Recommended Amount"). The Recommended Amount is in addition to, and does not supersede, the Partial Allowances. Allowance of the Recommended Amount as a Class II claim, together with the Partial Allowances, will fully and finally resolve all the PENAC proofs of claim as well as any rights PENAC has or may have under the Policies. Distributions based on that allowance will be made at the same intervals and at the same percentages as distributions to other Class II creditors of Home. Settlement Agreement ¶ 2. Bengelsdorf Aff. ¶ 5.

5. The Settlement Agreement is intended to finally resolve all the PENAC proofs of claim as well as any and all rights PENAC may have under the Policies. See Settlement Agreement ¶¶ 2, 5. To that end, the Settlement Agreement provides for mutual releases of all claims among the Liquidator, Home and PENAC arising from or related to the proofs of claim or the Policies. Id. ¶¶ 3, 4. The Liquidator also agrees not to pursue claims respecting the underlying matters covered by the proofs of claim against other insurers of PENAC that agree not to pursue such claims against Home. Id. ¶ 6. Bengelsdorf Aff. ¶ 6.

6. The Liquidator is not aware of any third party claimants who have asserted claims under the Policies. However, in resolving all matters relating to the proofs of claim and the Policies, the Settlement Agreement contemplates denial of any third party claimants' claims under the Policies in the Home liquidation without prejudice to their claims against PENAC. Accordingly, PENAC acknowledges in the Settlement Agreement that it is intended to resolve all matters between PENAC and the Liquidator/Home relating to the proofs of claim and the Policies, including asserted rights of third party claimants. Settlement Agreement ¶ 5. PENAC agrees to address, at its sole cost, the claims of claimants asserting claims against PENAC as if PENAC had no insurance coverage from Home under the Policies. *Id.* PENAC agrees to indemnify the Liquidator and Home against claims arising from the Policies up to the amounts ultimately distributed or distributable to PENAC. *Id.* Bengelsdorf Aff. ¶ 7.

7. The denial of any third party claimants' proofs of claim without prejudice to their claims against PENAC will not harm the third party claimants, who will continue to have their full claims against PENAC. As noted above, PENAC has agreed to address these claims as if it had no insurance coverage from Home under the Policies. Settlement Agreement ¶ 5. Third party claimants' proofs of claim against the insolvent Home, if not denied pursuant to this agreement, would release PENAC from those claims up to the limits of the Policies but only entitle the third party claimants (assuming their claims were allowed) to a presently undetermined percentage distribution at the future date when a distribution is made. See RSA 402-C:40, I; Gonya v. Commissioner, New Hampshire Insurance Dept., 153 N.H. 521, 535 (2006) (noting the "inherent uncertainty of any creditor's recovery in a liquidation"). It is not expected that the allowed claims of any third party claimants (or other Class II creditors) will be paid in full. Under the Settlement Agreement, PENAC will continue to be fully responsible for any third party claimants' claims against it. *See* Settlement Agreement ¶ 5. Bengelsdorf Aff. ¶ 8.

8. The Settlement Agreement reflects a compromise of the claims asserted in the proofs of claim. It is the result of negotiations involving the Claims Department, under the supervision of the Special Deputy Liquidator, which has extensive experience in assessing the exposure presented by claims for asbestos bodily injury under Home's insurance policies. The agreed settlement amount is based on careful evaluation and negotiation of coverage obligations under the Policies respecting the underlying liabilities of PENAC. The Liquidator accordingly recommends approval of the Settlement Agreement and allowance of the \$7,000,000 Recommended Amount as a Class II claim of PENAC in accordance with RSA 402-C:45 and RSA 402-C:44. This will bring PENAC's aggregate allowed Class II claims (the sum of the Recommended Amount and Partial Allowances) to \$11,791,963.48. Bengelsdorf Aff. ¶ 9.

9. The Court has previously approved similar settlement agreements. See, e.g., Order Approving Settlement Agreement with Viad (May 2, 2012); Order Approving Settlement Agreement with Vernay (April 9, 2012); Order Approving Settlement Agreement with Wisconsin Energy (March 18, 2010); Order Approving Settlement Agreement with Straits Steel (May 3, 2009); Order Approving Settlement Agreement with Georgia-Pacific (April 3, 2008); Order Approving Commutation Agreement with Northwestern National Insurance Company and Settlement Agreement and Assignment of Distribution with AK Steel Corporation (March 10, 2006). The Liquidator's negotiation and the Court's approval of such agreements are authorized by the broad authority of the Liquidator to "compound, compromise or in any other manner negotiate the amount for which claims will be recommended to the court," RSA 402-C:45, I, and the authority of the Court to "approve, disapprove or modify any report on claims by the liquidator." RSA 402-C:45, II. It is also an appropriate exercise of the Liquidator's authority ("[s]ubject to the court's control") to "do such other acts . . . as are necessary or expedient for the accomplishment of or in aid of the purpose of liquidation." RSA 402-C:25, XXII.

10. In his Motion for Approval of Commutation with Northwestern National Insurance Company and Settlement Agreement and Assignment of Distribution with AK Steel Corporation ¶¶ 19-23 (February 16, 2006), the Liquidator provided his analysis of New Hampshire law, including RSA 402-C:40 III, as it applies to this type of comprehensive policy coverage compromise and settlement in an insurer liquidation context. That analysis also applies to the proposed Settlement Agreement with PENAC.

11. The Liquidator submits that the Settlement Agreement is fair and reasonable and in the best interests of the policyholders and other creditors of Home. See Bengelsdorf Aff. ¶ 10.

WHEREFORE, the Liquidator respectfully requests that this Court:


- A. Grant this Motion;

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

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**SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT AND MUTUAL RELEASE**

This Settlement Agreement and Mutual Release ("Settlement Agreement") is made this 3<sup>rd</sup> day of <sup>August</sup> July 2012, by and between Philips Electronics North America Corporation and T H Agriculture & Nutrition, L.L.C. ("Claimants") on the one hand, and Roger A. Sevigny, Insurance Commissioner of the State of New Hampshire, solely in his capacity as Liquidator ("Liquidator") of The Home Insurance Company ("Home"), on the other hand (the Claimants and the Liquidator are hereinafter referred to collectively as the "Parties").

WHEREAS, Home issued insurance policies to North American Philips Corporation ("Philips"), predecessor to Philips Electronics North America Corporation ("PENAC"), under which Philips is the named insured:

which together with all other insurance policies that Home may have issued to Philips or Claimants are hereinafter defined collectively as the "Policies";

WHEREAS, Home is being liquidated pursuant to the June 13, 2003 Order of the Merrimack County Superior Court (the "Liquidation Court"), pursuant to which the Liquidator was appointed as the Liquidator of Home;

WHEREAS, PENAC has submitted claims in the Home liquidation estate, including claims with respect to claims against the T H Agriculture & Nutrition, L.L.C. Asbestos Personal Injury Trust ("Trust"), that have been assigned the following proof of claim numbers:

which together with any other proof of claim hereinbefore or hereinafter filed by Claimants in the Home liquidation estate are hereinafter defined collectively as the "Proofs of Claim";

**WHEREAS**, Claimants represent that they retain the rights and obligations with respect to the Policies for claims asserted against the Trust;

**WHEREAS**, the Parties are desirous of resolving all claims that were asserted, or could have been or could be asserted, between them and resolving all matters concerning the Proofs of Claim and all rights and obligations with respect to the Policies;

**WHEREAS**, the Liquidator has already issued to PENAC, and the Liquidation Court has approved, Proofs of Claim in the amount of \$3,857,941.25, \$455,221.86, and \$478,800.37 as Class II priority claims under N.H. RSA 402-C:44 (the "Partial Allowances");

**WHEREAS**, the Parties agree that this Settlement Agreement is subject to and conditioned upon its approval by the Liquidation Court and allowance of the Recommended Amount (as defined below) into the Home liquidation estate and in the event that the Liquidation Court does not approve the Settlement Agreement and allow the Recommended Amount, this Settlement Agreement shall be null and void and without any force or effect;

**NOW, THEREFORE**, in consideration of all the respective transactions contemplated by this Settlement Agreement, and the mutual covenants and representations herein contained, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

1. Effectiveness. This Settlement Agreement is conditioned and shall only become effective (the "Effective Date") upon approval by the Liquidation Court. The Liquidator shall move at his expense for approval of this Settlement Agreement promptly following execution by

all Parties.

2. Recommendation, Allowance, and Classification of Claims

- A. Subject to all the terms of this Settlement Agreement, and with the agreement of Claimants, which by Claimants' execution hereof is hereby granted, the Liquidator shall recommend pursuant to N.H. RSA 402-C:45 that the Proofs of Claim be allowed in the amount of \$7,000,000 (the "Recommended Amount") as a Class II priority claim under N.H. RSA 402-C:44. The Recommended Amount shall be in addition to and shall not supersede the Partial Allowances. The Liquidator shall seek allowance of the Recommended Amount as a Class II priority claim by the Liquidation Court in the Liquidator's motion for approval of this Settlement Agreement.
- B. Allowance of the Recommended Amount as a Class II claim by the Liquidation Court in addition to the Partial Allowances shall fully and finally resolve the Proofs of Claim and any and all claims of whatever nature under the Policies that Claimants have. In the event that the Liquidation Court does not allow the Recommended Amount as a Class II claim, this Settlement Agreement shall be null and void and shall have no force and effect and the Parties will be returned to *status quo ante*, as if no such agreement was ever reached, with this Settlement Agreement thereafter being inadmissible for any purpose in any dispute between the Parties.
- C. If and when the Liquidation Court allows the Recommended Amount as a Class II claim, Claimants will become a Class II creditor in the Home liquidation estate pursuant to N.H. RSA 402-C:44, and Claimants shall, subject to this Settlement Agreement, receive distributions on the allowed amount at the same intervals and at the same percentages as other Class II creditors of Home. All distributions shall be paid to PENAC.

3. Release by Claimants. Subject to the terms of this Settlement Agreement and the Liquidation Court's approval of the Recommended Amount as a Class II claim, Claimants for themselves and the Trust and on behalf of their respective officers, directors, employees, agents, attorneys, subsidiaries, affiliates, predecessors, and their successors and assigns, irrevocably and unconditionally release and discharge the Liquidator and Home and each of their respective officers, directors, employees, agents, attorneys, subsidiaries, affiliates, predecessors, successors, and assigns (including any trustee or other statutory successor), from any and all actions, causes of action, liabilities, adjustments, obligations, offsets, suits, debts, dues, sums of money, accounts, reckonings, bonds, bills, premiums, losses, salvage, specialties, covenants, contracts, controversies, agreements, promises, variances, trespasses, damages, judgments, extents, executions, claims, and/or demands, arising from or related to the Proofs of Claim or to the Policies, in law, admiralty, or equity, which Claimants, the Trust, or their subsidiaries, affiliates, predecessors, successors, and assigns, ever had, now have, or hereafter may have against the Liquidator or Home or their respective officers, directors, employees, agents, attorneys, subsidiaries, affiliates, predecessors, successors, and assigns, all whether known or unknown, suspected or unsuspected, fixed or contingent, in law, admiralty or equity, arising from or related to the Proofs of Claim or to the Policies.

4. Release by Liquidator Subject to the terms of this Settlement Agreement and the Liquidation Court's approval of the Recommended Amount as a Class II claim, the Liquidator, in his capacity as such, and on behalf of Home and each of their respective officers, directors, employees, agents, attorneys, subsidiaries, affiliates, predecessors, and their successors and assigns, irrevocably and unconditionally releases and discharges Claimants, the Trust and each of their respective officers, directors, employees, agents, attorneys, subsidiaries, affiliates, predecessors, successors, and assigns, from any and all actions, causes of action, liabilities,

adjustments, obligations, offsets, suits, debts, dues, sums of money, accounts, reckonings, bonds, bills, premiums, losses, salvage, specialties, covenants, contracts, controversies, agreements, promises, variances, trespasses, damages, judgments, extents, executions, claims, and/or demands, arising from or related to the Proofs of Claim or to the Policies, in law, admiralty, or equity, which the Liquidator, Home, or their subsidiaries, affiliates, predecessors, successors, and assigns, ever had, now have, or hereafter may have against Claimants, the Trust, or their respective officers, directors, employees, agents, attorneys, subsidiaries, affiliates, predecessors, successors, and assigns, all whether known or unknown, suspected or unsuspected, fixed or contingent, in law, admiralty or equity, arising from or related to the Proofs of Claim or to the Policies.

5. Resolution of Matters and Indemnification. Claimants acknowledge that this Settlement Agreement is intended to resolve all matters arising out of or relating to any rights Claimants ever had, now have, or hereafter may have in the Policies and the Proofs of Claim, including any asserted rights of third-party claimants against Claimants under the Policies, and Claimants agree to address, at their sole cost and expense, any such claims of third-party claimants against Claimants as if there had been no liquidation proceeding for Home and as if Claimants had no insurance coverage from Home by virtue of the Policies. In consideration of the Recommended Amount being allowed by the Liquidation Court as a Class II claim, Claimants agree to indemnify and hold the Liquidator and Home harmless from and against any and all claims, losses, liabilities, debts, damages, costs or expenses arising from or relating to the Policies and such indemnification shall be capped at the total amount ultimately distributed or distributable in relation to the Recommended Amount as allowed by the Liquidation Court. The future obligations of Claimants under this paragraph shall extend to and include (by way of example and not limitation) claims for defense or indemnity for claims made under the Policies

against the Liquidator or Home by the Trust, vendors, or by other insurers of Claimants, or by any individuals or entities asserting "direct action" claims arising out of or related to the Policies. The Liquidator shall promptly notify Claimants of any such claim, and shall afford Claimants the opportunity to reasonably participate in the defense of such claims. The Liquidator shall assert all defenses to such claims reasonably available to the Liquidator, including defenses under the Order of Liquidation or the New Hampshire Insurers Rehabilitation and Liquidation Act. Claimants shall cooperate with the Liquidator (including but not limited to the provision of affidavits or testimony) to defend against and resolve such claims.

6. Mutual Release of Settling Carriers. Claimants agree to use reasonable commercial efforts to cause any settlement agreement relating to the underlying matters covered by the Proofs of Claim with any other insurance company to include a waiver by that other insurance company of any claim, including contribution, apportionment, indemnification, subrogation, equitable subrogation, allocation, or recoupment, against Home regarding these matters. The Liquidator agrees to waive, relinquish and release any claim, including contribution, apportionment, indemnification, subrogation, equitable subrogation, allocation, or recoupment, as to the matters covered by the Proofs of Claim against any other insurance company which executes a settlement with Claimants that includes a provision that is materially the same as this paragraph

7. No Assignments. Claimants warrants and represents that (1) they have not assigned, conveyed, or otherwise transferred any claims, demands, causes of action, rights, or obligations related in any way to the Policies, or any proceeds thereof, or to the claims, losses and expenses released herein, to any person or entity, and (2) Philips has not assigned, conveyed or otherwise transferred any claims related in any way to the Policies, or any proceeds thereof, to any person or entity. Claimants shall not assign or otherwise transfer this Settlement Agreement or any



rights or obligations thereunder without the written consent of the Liquidator, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.

8. Further Assurances. The Parties shall take all further actions as may be necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this Settlement Agreement and to consummate the transactions contemplated herein.

Claimants acknowledge they are aware of the requirements of the Medicare Secondary Payer Act and the Medicare, Medicaid and SCHIP Extension Act of 2007, including provisions Concerning Medicare Set-Asides and/or notification to the Centers For Medicare and Medicaid Services (“CMS”) regarding certain Medicare-eligible, or potentially eligible, claimants who enter into settlement agreements that may justify recovery for Medicare covered case-related services. Claimants acknowledge that they may be obligated, and otherwise agree, to provide data, including data from the Trust, if and when required or requested, for CMS regarding claimants who will share in distributions from Claimants’ assets that include a portion of the Recommended Amount.

9. Governing Law and Venue. This Settlement Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire without regard to the conflicts of law provisions thereof. The Parties agree that the exclusive venue for any dispute between the Parties arising out of the Proofs of Claim, the Policies or this Settlement Agreement shall be the Liquidation Court.

10. Due Diligence. The Parties acknowledge and agree that, in negotiating and executing this Settlement Agreement, they have relied upon their own judgment and upon the recommendations of their own legal counsel, that they have read this Settlement Agreement and have had the opportunity to consider its terms and effects, and that they have executed this Settlement Agreement voluntarily and with full understanding of its terms and effects. This

Settlement Agreement is the product of negotiations between the Parties. No Party shall be charged with having promulgated this Settlement Agreement, and the general rule that ambiguities are to be construed against the drafter shall not apply to this Agreement.

11. No Third Party Rights. This Settlement Agreement is entered into solely for the benefit of the Liquidator, Home, and Claimants and is not intended to, and does not give or create any rights to or in any person or entity other than the Parties.

12. Counterparts. This Settlement Agreement may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which, when so delivered, shall be an original, but such counterparts shall together constitute one and the same instrument. The Parties agree that a signature sent by facsimile or electronic mail to the other Party shall have the same force and effect as an original signature.

13. Power and Authority to Execute. Subject to the approval of the Liquidation Court required by paragraph 1, each Party hereto represents and warrants that it has the full power and authority to execute, deliver, and perform this Settlement Agreement; that all requisite and necessary approvals have been obtained to consummate the transactions contemplated by this Settlement Agreement; that there are no other agreements or transactions to which it is a party that would render this Settlement Agreement or any part thereof, void, voidable or unenforceable; that each individual signing on behalf of a Party has been duly authorized by that Party to execute this Settlement Agreement on its behalf; and that no claims being released under the terms of this Settlement Agreement have been assigned, sold, or otherwise transferred to any other entity.

14. Successor-in-Interest Bound. This Settlement Agreement shall be binding upon, and shall inure to the benefit of the Parties and their respective officers, directors, employees, affiliates, attorneys, liquidators, receivers, administrators, agents, representatives, successors, and assigns.

15. Entire Agreement. This Settlement Agreement constitutes the entire agreement and understanding between the Parties with respect to the subject matter thereof. This Settlement Agreement supersedes all prior agreements and understandings, whether written or oral, concerning such matters.

16. Survival of Warranties and Representations. The warranties and representations made herein shall survive the execution of this Settlement Agreement.

17. Validity of Settlement Agreement. Subject to approval of this Settlement Agreement by the Liquidation Court as required by paragraph 1, each Party represents and warrants that this Settlement Agreement is a legal, valid, and binding obligation, enforceable in accordance with its terms.

18. No Waiver. No waiver of any right under this Settlement Agreement shall be deemed effective unless contained in a writing signed by the Party or an authorized representative of the Party charged with such waiver, and no waiver of any breach or failure to perform shall be deemed to be a waiver of any future breach or failure to perform or of any other provision of this Settlement Agreement. This Settlement Agreement may not be amended except in a document signed by the Party or an officer or other authorized official of the Party to be charged.

19. Notice. All notices to be given under this Settlement Agreement shall be given by facsimile and first class U.S. mail directed to:

20. Severability. enforceable, and legal and which reflect, to the extent possible, the purposes contained in the invalid, unenforceable, or illegal provision.
