LIQUIDATOR'S FIFTY-FIFTH REPORT

- I, Roger A. Sevigny, Insurance Commissioner for the State of New Hampshire, as Liquidator ("Liquidator") of The Home Insurance Company ("Home"), hereby submit this Fifty-Fifth Report on the liquidation of Home, as of December 15, 2014, in accordance with RSA 402-C:25 and the Order Concerning Liquidator's Reports issued January 19, 2005.
- 1. Proofs of claim. The claim filing deadline in the Home liquidation was June 13, 2004. The Liquidator received seven new proofs of claim for Home between the last Liquidator's report and December 1, 2014. The proofs of claim submitted now total 20,672. The proof of claim count includes as a single proof of claim (a) multiple proofs received from a claimant that appear to assert the same claim, and (b) claims filed on behalf of mass tort claimants against a single insured. It is difficult to summarize the proofs of claim in advance of the claim determination process because (a) those proofs of claim that quantify the claim may be overstated or understated, (b) most proofs of claim do not quantify the amount claimed, and (c) an individual proof of claim may involve many different claims and claimants.
- 2. <u>Claim determinations and reports</u>. The process of determining proofs of claim continues. Since the last Liquidator's report, the Liquidator has issued partial or final notices of determination addressing 201 proofs of claim for Home pursuant to the Restated and Revised Order Establishing Procedures Regarding Claims entered January 19, 2005 ("Claims Procedures

Order"). As of December 1, 2014, the Liquidator has issued 20,156 determinations for Home totaling approximately \$2.26 billion. As of December 1, 2014, 19,429 determinations (including settlements) involving a total amount of approximately \$2.18 billion have been approved by the Court. The 19,429 determinations are comprised of 16,671 final and 2,758 partial determinations. Partial determinations address proofs of claim shown to include a verified paid loss along with a remaining potential or claimed unliquidated exposure.

The Liquidator continues to file reports of claims and recommendations when a sufficient number of claim determinations have passed the 60-day period for objections under RSA 402-C:41, I. Since the last Liquidator's report, the Liquidator has submitted two reports of claims and recommendations to the Court reflecting a total of approximately \$20.7 million in determinations. In addition, the Liquidator has moved for approval of three settlement agreements since the last report reflecting a total of approximately \$84 million in determinations.

3. <u>Late-filed claims</u>. The Order of Liquidation established June 13, 2004 as the deadline for filing claims in Home's liquidation proceeding. Pursuant to the New Hampshire Insurers Rehabilitation and Liquidation Act ("Act"), claims filed after the claim filing deadline are allowed to participate in distributions of the estate provided the late filing of the claim is "excused" for good cause shown. See RSA 402-C:37, II. The Act provides a non-exclusive list of five examples of "good cause" for a late filing to be excused, including that the "existence of a claim was not known to the claimant and that he filed within 30 days after he learned of it." <u>Id</u>. "Unexcused" late filed claims are not permitted to receive the first distribution from the estate, but may receive subsequent distributions. RSA 402-C:37, III. (In both cases, payment is permitted only if it will not "prejudice the orderly administration of the liquidation." RSA 402-C:37, II, III.)

All proofs of claim received by the Liquidator are reviewed to determine whether the claim is timely filed or, if late, whether the late filing of the claim is to be "excused." Claimants with late filed claims which are found to be "unexcused" are informed of that determination and that they will not receive the first distribution in the Liquidator's notice of claim determination.

- 4. Requests for review and objections. A notice of determination is sent to a claimant when the Liquidator determines a claim. Each notice of determination includes instructions on how to dispute the determination under New Hampshire statutes and the Claim Procedures Order. Since inception 821 claimants have filed requests for review; 568 of these have been sent notices of redetermination or have withdrawn the request for review. Claimants have filed 56 objections with the Court to commence disputed claim proceedings. As of December 1, 2014, there are four disputed claim proceedings pending before the Referee or Court, including one (2005-HICIL-4) that has been stayed. The Claims Procedures Order provides for review of the Referee's reports by motion to recommit. One such motion is presently pending.
- 5. <u>Financial reports</u>. The unaudited September 30, 2014 financial statements for Home are attached as Exhibit A to this report. The September 30, 2014 Home statements reflect \$1,249,718,286 in assets under the Liquidator's direct control, and \$77,465,560 in reinsurance collections, net investment income, and other receipts and \$14,608,197 in operating disbursements from January 1 through September 30, 2014.
- 6. <u>2014 Budget</u>. A comparison of the actual and budgeted general and administrative expenses of the Home liquidation, on an incurred basis, through September, 2014 is attached as Exhibit B. As of September 30, 2014, actual expenses were below budget by approximately \$496,000 or 3.8 %, with favorable variances in most categories. Below is a

comparison of the annual budgeted and actual operating expenses (in millions) beginning January 1, 2004:

The Liquidator filed a copy of the 2015 Budget on November 7, 2014 as Exhibit 8 to the Liquidator's Filing Regarding Status Report. As of December 1, 2014, the liquidation has 53 employees and 6 consultants.

7. Investment update. A summary of Home's holdings of bonds and short-term investments as of September 30, 2014 is attached as Exhibit C, and a report listing the individual holdings of Home as of that date is attached as Exhibit D (the groupings on Exhibit C differ from those on Exhibit D). The book value of Home's bonds and short-term investments managed by Conning Asset Management ("Conning") at September 30, 2014, was approximately \$1.2046 billion compared to their market value of \$1.2134 billion. This represented an unrealized gain (market value above book value) of approximately \$8.8 million. Short-term holdings in the Conning-managed portfolio at September 30, 2014 were \$26.9 million at market value. The portfolio is expected to generate approximately \$32 million of cash from net investment income in 2014, as continuing reductions in yields on reinvested assets are expected to have an impact on future investment income.

The average credit rating for the Conning-managed portfolio holdings is Aa3 by Moody's and AA- by S&P. The Liquidator continues to maintain, outside of Conning's control, investments in US Treasury bills and notes. As of September 30, 2014, such investments for Home had a market value of approximately \$9.6 million. These assets, along with sweep bank accounts, will be used to fund operating requirements.

As of December 3, 2014, the Conning-managed portfolio had an unrealized gain of \$12.2 million as a decrease in interest rates caused an increase in the gain from September 30, 2014. As of December 10, 2014, the Liquidator and Conning believe that all securities in the portfolio will pay full amounts of principal in spite of fluctuating market values.

Market values of the portfolio can fluctuate widely as credit spreads change and as continuing sluggish economic growth coincides with the inflationary effects of large new issuances of government debt. Additional pressures on market values may result from uncertainties about the continuation and magnitude of low interest rate policies by the U.S. Federal Reserve as well as the other central banks around the world. Market value sensitivities analysis performed by Conning indicated that market values could potentially fluctuate \$37 million downwards and \$32 million upwards if interest rates increased or decreased 100 basis points, respectively, based on the portfolio values as of September 30, 2014. Consistent with the investment guidelines, the Liquidator and Conning continue to focus on (a) preservation of capital on investments, (b) maintaining a high quality portfolio, and (c) consistent with objectives (a) and (b), maximizing current income.

8. <u>Early access distributions to guaranty funds</u>. As described in the Liquidator's previous reports, the Liquidator has made early access distributions to guaranty funds in almost all years from 2005 through 2013. The Liquidator makes a distribution only after obtaining

approval from the Court and the required "claw back" agreements with the guaranty funds requiring the return of any amounts advanced that are necessary to pay creditors whose claims fall in the same or a higher priority class. See RSA 402-C:29, III. The cash payments from the Home liquidation to guaranty funds for the nine early access distributions totaled \$232 million. Early access distributions are generally subject to deductions for deposits, deductible reimbursements, recoveries from guaranty fund statutory net worth insureds, Second Injury Fund reimbursements, Class I and Class V claim expenses, questioned claim items and an early access distribution cap. They are also subject to the "claw back" agreements with the guaranty funds.

The Liquidator has made early access distributions to a total of 54 guaranty funds from 2005 through 2013. However, in connection with the analysis performed in anticipation of a potential tenth early access distribution, 48 guaranty funds were found to have exceeded the established distribution cap of 40% of the guaranty fund's paid loss and expense and case reserves. Of these guaranty funds, 26 are being reviewed for possible claw back requests. Given the large number of guaranty funds affected by the cap and the decreasing guaranty funds claim volume over the last few years, the Liquidator intends to apply an additional cap on early access as a percentage of the guaranty fund's cumulative paid claims. An analysis is being performed to assess the next early access distribution and whether requests for claw backs should be issued. The Liquidator anticipates seeking to make a tenth early access distribution in 2015.

9. <u>Interim distribution and resolution of litigation with the United States</u>. The Liquidator's principal goals in this liquidation have been to determine claims and collect assets for the ultimate purpose of distributing assets to the creditors of Home. While there are substantially more claims to determine and assets to collect, the Liquidator believes that it is reasonable to make an interim distribution of fifteen (15) percent on Class II claims that have

been allowed by the Court. Accordingly, on February 13, 2012, the Liquidator filed a Motion for Approval of Interim Distribution to Claimants With Allowed Class II Claims (the "Interim Distribution Motion"). The Court granted the Interim Distribution Motion in an Order dated March 13, 2012. One paragraph of the Order regarding the timing of interim distributions to claimants with subsequently allowed Class II claims was amended by Order dated July 2, 2012.

Among other things, the interim distribution is subject to receipt of a waiver of federal priority claims from the United States in a form acceptable to the Liquidator. Under the Federal Priority Statute, 31 U.S.C. § 3713, claims of the United States are to be paid first in insolvency proceedings on pain of personal liability of the person responsible – in insurer liquidations, the liquidator. In light of the McCarran-Ferguson Act, policy-level claims afforded priority under state insurer liquidation statutes have priority over non-policy federal claims notwithstanding the Priority Statute. United States Dep't. of the Treasury v. Fabe, 508 U.S. 491, 493, 508-09 (1993); Ruthardt v. United States, 303 F.3d 375, 381-84 (1st Cir. 2002), cert. denied, 538 U.S. 1031 (2003). However, claims of the United States are not subject to state court ordered time limits. Ruthardt, 303 F.3d at 384-86; Garcia v. Island Program Designer, Inc., 4 F.3d 57, 62 (1st Cir. 1993). The Liquidator thus may face potential personal liability in the event "late-filed" federal policy-level claims cannot be paid because assets were previously distributed to other creditors.

The Liquidator accordingly requested a waiver from the United States Department of Justice ("DOJ") on April 12, 2012. The Liquidator followed up on this request on numerous occasions and promptly responded to DOJ requests for information over the next year and several months as summarized in prior Liquidator's reports. In December 2013, the Liquidator's request had been pending with DOJ for sixteen months, DOJ's review process was unclear, and the Liquidator could not predict when, if ever, DOJ would act on the request. Without resolution

of the issues presented by the position of the United States with respect to the Federal Priority Statute, the Liquidator was unable to distribute assets to policyholders and others holding policylevel claims even though all known federal claims had been provided for and a conservative reserve for unknown claims including federal claims established.

In the circumstances, on September 9, 2013, the Liquidator filed a lawsuit in the United States District Court in New Hampshire against the United States and its Attorney General seeking (1) a declaration that making the court-approved interim distribution does not violate federal law and expose the Liquidator to potential personal liability under the Federal Priority Statute, and (2) an order directing the United States to act on the Liquidator's request for waiver. Roger A. Sevigny, in his official capacity as Insurance Commissioner of the State of New Hampshire, as Liquidator of The Home Insurance Company v. United States of America and Eric H. Holder, Jr., in his official capacity as Attorney General of the United States, No. 1:13-cv-401 (D.N.H.). The United States responded by filing a motion to dismiss the complaint, which the Liquidator opposed. On July 21, 2014, the Court issued a Memorandum and Order on the United States' motion to dismiss (1) denying the motion as to Court I, the declaratory judgment count, and (2) granting the motion as to Count II, the request for an order to compel a decision on the request for a waiver. The United States filed its answer to the declaratory judgment parts of the complaint on September 4, 2014. On September 9, 2014, the Liquidator filed a motion for summary judgment with a supporting memorandum of law and affidavit.¹

As reported in the Liquidator's Status report filed July 31, 2014 and in paragraph 9 of the Liquidator's Fifty-Fourth Report, the Liquidator and the United States engaged in settlement

discussions. As set forth in the Liquidator's Report Regarding Release Agreement with the United States filed November 7, 2014, the United States and the Liquidator agreed upon a waiver of federal priority claims in a form acceptable to the Liquidator in the Release Agreement dated November 5, 2014. A copy of the Release Agreement was attached as Exhibit 1 to the November 7, 2014 Report. The Release Agreement satisfies the condition in paragraph 8 of the Court's March 13, 2012 Order approving the interim distribution. The Release Agreement also addresses the process for future waiver requests. As provided in the Release Agreement, the Liquidator dismissed the lawsuit against the United States without prejudice by filing a joint stipulation of dismissal in the litigation on November 6, 2014.

10. The interim distribution. The Liquidator filed his Report Regarding Process for Interim Distribution on November 12, 2014. That report set forth the process by which the Liquidator would make the 15% interim distribution to claimants, or their assignees, with Class II priority claims allowed by the Court over the course of the liquidation, from June 2003 through November 30, 2014. The Liquidator has followed that process.

In order to avoid sending distribution checks to addresses that are out-of-date, the Liquidator has sent emails or letters to all claimants or, where applicable, their assignees, to advise of the distribution and to request that they confirm in writing their address and other pertinent information relating to the distribution. As of December 15, 2014, the Liquidator has received written confirmations relating to all but seven of the distribution checks (which seven await resolution of various legal issues or receipt of the required written confirmation).² The Liquidator has mailed all other checks to the claimant or assignee at the confirmed address.

² A number of claimants or assignees did not respond to the initial requests. The Liquidator sent a subsequent request to the address of record and attempted telephone contact in an effort to reach the distribution recipients. The Liquidator also conducted internet searches. In those cases where the Liquidator has not received a response confirming the correct recipient and a current address, the distribution check will not for the present time be issued.

Milliman reserve study. The Liquidator has previously engaged the actuarial firm Milliman, Inc. to estimate Home's unpaid direct liabilities. A copy of the Executive Summary of the Milliman report concerning unpaid loss and ALAE as of December 31, 2012, was attached as an exhibit to the Liquidator's Fifty-First Report, and Milliman's prior analysis of unpaid loss and ALAE as of December 31, 2010, was used in the Liquidator's Interim Distribution Motion.

The Liquidator has now engaged Milliman to estimate Home's unpaid direct liabilities as of December 31, 2014. The Liquidator expects that Milliman will complete its work and provide its report in mid-2015. The Liquidator will consider the potential for a second interim distribution when that Milliman report is in hand, and he presently anticipates making a recommendation to the Court concerning such a distribution later in 2015.

12. Reinsurance. The collection of reinsurance is the principal remaining assetmarshaling task of the Liquidator. The Liquidator has billed and collected reinsurance throughout the liquidation, and he has entered into commutations with certain reinsurers of Home to resolve relationships with those reinsurers for agreed payments. The amounts the Liquidator has received through reinsurance collections, including commutations, as well as estimates of future collections are included in the "Estimated Ultimate Asset Collection" number provided in the Liquidator's Filing Regarding Status Report filed annually in November.

The Liquidator reports, in accordance with the Court's December 23, 2004 order, that since the last report he has completed one ceded commutation which is described in the confidential appendix submitted with this report.

13. <u>Distributions to Class I Creditors</u>. The Liquidator has recommended in various of his reports of claims and recommendations that the Court approve certain claims by guaranty associations for administrative expenses from inception to September 30, 2013, which are Class I

claims under RSA 402-C:44 pursuant to RSA 404-B:11, II, as well as a few other Class I claims and the 10% part allowed guaranty fund defense expense payments assigned to Class I under the Settlement Agreement with 56 guaranty funds approved by Order dated July 15, 2013. The Court has approved the claim reports, and the Liquidator accordingly has at various times made distributions to the Class I creditors. To date, the Class I distributions to guaranty funds total \$51.8 million (after deduction of setoffs). A report of claims and recommendation was submitted by the Liquidator to the Court for approval since the last Liquidator's report reflecting a total of approximately \$15.9 million in additional Class I determinations.

14. Significant litigation. Massachusetts Second Injury and COLA Reimbursement. The Liquidator commenced an administrative proceeding before the Massachusetts Department of Industrial Accidents (the "DIA") seeking second-injury reimbursement from the Workers' Compensation Trust Fund, as well as cost of living adjustment reimbursement for payments to Massachusetts workers' compensation claimants. In a decision filed on February 6, 2012, Judge Taub, ruling on the COLA reimbursement claim, found in favor of the Trust Fund holding that Home lacked standing to bring the claim and that even if Home had standing it had not, after it went into liquidation, actually paid benefits to the workers' compensation claimants and thus was not entitled to recovery as to post-liquidation amounts. Home appealed to the DIA Reviewing Board on February 15, 2012. In June 2014, the Reviewing Board issued its decision affirming Judge Taub's decision on different reasoning. Home has appealed to the Massachusetts Appeals Court. Home submitted its brief on to that court on November 26, 2014. Amicus briefs supporting Home were filed by the Massachusetts Insurance Insolvency Fund and Lumbermens Mutual Insurance Company, an insolvent insurer that is also seeking recovery of second injury and COLA claims from the DIA.

- 15. Asset dispositions (including compromises) and assumptions of obligations. In accordance with paragraph 5 of the Order Establishing Procedures for Review of Certain Agreements to Assume Obligations or Dispose of Assets entered April 29, 2004, and paragraph 5 of the Liquidator's Eleventh Report, the Liquidator submits a confidential schedule of asset dispositions (including compromises) and obligation assumptions since the last report which is filed under seal as an appendix to this report.
- 16. <u>Ancillary proceedings in the United States</u>. Ancillary receiverships for Home remain pending in Oregon, New York, and Massachusetts.

Notes to Financial Statements

September 30, 2014

1) Basis of Accounting

These financial statements are prepared using the modified cash basis of accounting which differs from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States. Only those assets that are within the possession of the Liquidator and other known amounts for which ultimate realization is expected to occur, primarily investments and cash, and certain receivables, are recorded. Liabilities that have been acknowledged by the Liquidator are prioritized into creditor classes in accordance with the New Hampshire Statute establishing creditor classes in insurer insolvencies, RSA 402-C: 44. Only incurred but unpaid Class I (Administration Costs) liabilities, which are in a creditor class superior to all other classes, are presented in these financial statements.

These financial statements do not record the amounts of certain assets such as outstanding receivables, reinsurance recoverables, securities on deposit with various states, early access distributions, funds held and claims against others, and certain liabilities, including insurance claims, as such amounts have not been settled and agreed to with third parties.

The amount shown for losses and loss expenses paid primarily represents (1) loss expenses accorded administrative expense priority by the rehabilitation order and liquidation order, and (2) expenses relating to obtaining claim recoveries which also are entitled to administrative expense priority. Checks issued for such losses and loss expenses that are not cashed are reflected as liabilities.

Unrestricted illiquid assets represent investments in common stock and limited partnership interests which are not liquid since these are not publicly traded.

Realized capital gains and losses on sale of bonds are calculated based on original cost of the bonds. Proceeds received above or below cost on maturity of bonds are included as part of net investment income.

Proceeds received above or below original cost are treated as a gain or loss upon disposition of common stock.

This statement does not include any assets of Home's branches outside of the United States.

The amount of accrued expenses at December 31, 2013 was \$3,156,096 and net assets for 2014 increased by \$701,073 due to the decrease in the accrual.

Various full-time employees of Home are covered by employee incentive plans, which were approved by Merrimack County Superior Court of the State of New Hampshire (the Court) on January 7, 2014. The costs of these plans are primarily payable in 2014, but are based on 2013 service and are being accrued over the service period in 2013. Accrued administrative expense includes \$1,419,265 of incentive plan costs.

4) Restricted Funds

The Liquidator has drawn down on letters of credit (LOC) upon receiving notices of cancellation or notices of non-renewal from the issuing bank. Such LOC drawdowns relate to insurance losses not yet proven and/or settled and are recognized as restricted cash receipts. Restricted funds will be recognized as unrestricted reinsurance recoveries when such balances are proven and/or settled between the beneficial owner and the Liquidator. Restricted funds related to reinsurance recoveries total \$321,891 at the end of September 30, 2014.

Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

5) Securities on Deposit

Investments on deposit at the original cost with various states were \$995,432, \$1,099,521, and \$73,947,287 at September 30, 2014, December 31, 2013 and June 13, 2003, respectively. As described in Note 1, the Liquidator does not record the amount of these assets, as such amounts have not been settled and agreed to with the states.

Various states have withdrawn such deposits and related interest for use by the related state guaranty associations. The market value of these withdrawals in the amount of \$56,443,936 may be offset against future distributions to such guaranty associations.

6) Early Access Distribution

On February 26, 2013 the Court approved the ninth early access distribution to insurance guaranty associations based on guaranty association payments through September 30, 2012. The Liquidator paid \$9,554,234 through December 31, 2013. The total of all early access payments through September 30, 2014 was \$232 million.

Early access distributions and related advances are not recorded as assets in the accompanying Statement of Net Assets although they represent payments in advance of distributions to other claimants. Early access distributions and related advances will ultimately be credited against amounts payable to Guaranty Associations to ensure pro rata distributions amongst members of the same class of creditor of Home. The following summary represents early access distributions and related advances that are not reflected in the Statement of Net Assets.

7) Home Deductible Policies - Reimbursement

On April 6, 2011, the Court approved an agreement between the Liquidator and the Guaranty Associations regarding Home Deductible policies (the Deductible Agreement). The Deductible Agreement provides that the Liquidator will reimburse the signatory Guaranty Associations for deductible amounts collected during liquidation. The Liquidator also charges a fee of 7.5% as reimbursement of the Home's expenses incurred in the collection process. Forty five Guaranty Associations have signed the Deductible Agreement to date. On February 11, 2014, the Liquidator paid \$ 330,329 after netting of the fee. On May 7, 2013, the Liquidator paid \$402,449 after netting of the fee.

8) Allowed Claims

As of September 30, 2014, the Liquidator has allowed, and the Court has approved, \$52,420,507 of Class I claims, \$1,939,474,143 of Class II claims, \$2,672,527 of Class III claims, \$189,269,690 of Class V claims and \$5,315 of Class VIII claims. Class I claims paid for the year included \$4,626,964 for the fourth distribution of Guaranty Associations' administrative costs. It is management's judgment that there will not be sufficient assets to make distributions on allowed claims below the Class II priority. Distributions on allowed claims will depend on the amount of assets available for distribution and the allowed claims in each successive priority class under New Hampshire RSA 402-C: 44.

9) Motion for Interim Distribution

On February 10, 2012, the Liquidator submitted a motion to the Court seeking approval for a 15% interim distribution on allowed Class II claims. The interim distribution was approved by the Court on March 13, 2012 and is subject to a waiver of federal priority claims from the United States Department of Justice. The waiver was received on November 5, 2014. The cash distribution is anticipated to be paid in December 2014 and will total approximately \$228 million.
